

DEATH OF MRS. JOHN PLATT.

The death took place at her residence, Oakleigh, Leamington, on Friday of last week, of Alice, widow of Mr. John Platt, M.P.

Her remains were laid to rest in Chadderton Cemetery on Tuesday. The body was conveyed from Leamington on Monday, the coffin lying all night in St. Thomas's Church, Werneth. Here at twelve o'clock on Tuesday the first part of the burial service was read and sung—the service being fully choral. The officiating clergymen were the Rev. Canon Rountree (vicar of St. Thomas's), and the Rev. A. Burr, of Uphill Rectory, Werneth. Mrs. Platt attended and led the singing of the hymn "Born by Thy Angels through the awful way" (arranged by the vicar from Dean Holt's hymn for the memorial of her late Majesty Queen Victoria).

After service in the church the funeral cortège was formed and the mourning coaches passed slowly to the cemetery, where at the family vault the ceremony was concluded. At the grave-side the hymn "Peace, perfect peace" was sung.

Immediately preceding the funeral car was a carriage containing the Rev. Canon Rountree and the Rev. A. Burr, with Mr. G. S. Clayton, family solicitor. Then came the car, and the following carriages with the family and other mourners:
